#### **Brief introduction**


The South Eastern University of Sri Lanka (SEUSL) was established in 1995. The main campus, which strategically located along the coastal belt of Oluvil, extends over 178.98 acres of green pasture (As per the land valuation in 2011). Due to the continuous sea erosion exists in the east part of the university (Oluvil premises), around 25.45 acres of the land was devasted so far. The Faculty of Applied Sciences is located in Sammanthurai at an extent of 6.72 acres (As per the land valuation in 2011). The Malwaththa farm (extent of 35.25 acres), which comes under the purview of the Faculty of Technology, is used for conducting practical classes on Agricultural Technology. The University has recorded a tremendous progress in higher education sector.

The South Eastern University of Sri Lanka has the focus on achieving academic excellence and producing employable graduates to cater to the demands of both private and public sectors in Sri Lanka and abroad. It endeavors to enhance the multidisciplinary research culture, serving the needs of different stakeholders and the community. In addition, the university is greatly contributing to the peace and harmony of the region. Presently, SEUSL has six faculties with 5,558 internal undergraduates and 405 postgraduate students. The university has 662 permanent staff including, 189 academic staff.

#### New study Programmes to be commenced

SEUSL has taken steps to offer many new degree programmes in order to cater to the needs of the country. FAC has submitted a proposal to the UGC to introduce the Bachelor of Arts Honours in Education degree programme for the approval. Meanwhile FAC has developed a proposal to commence Bachelor of Arts Honours in History and submitted for approval of the relevant Authorities.

FMC is developing a proposal to commence BBA (Special) degree in Management Information Technology and BBA (Special) degree in Entrepreneurship.

FAS has developed a proposal to commence the Diploma in Computer Science programme and awaiting approval from the Faculty Board. Further, the FAS is to commence the Postgraduate Degree Programs by Research with the formation of the Board of Studies such as Biological Sciences, Chemical Sciences, Physical Sciences, Computer Sciences, and Applied Statistics & Mathematics.

FIA is developing a proposal to commence a BA external degree programme in Islamic Banking and Finance, Further, the faculty is awaiting approval of the Senate and the Council to commence Diploma and Certificate programmes in Arabic Language.

#### World Ranking

Webomatrics ranking of the South Eastern University of Sri Lanka is 8029 in January 2021. Measures are being taken to improve the world ranking of the SEUSL in a very competitive world where educational institutions are striving hard to offer better services.

The staff population (Permennat staff) of the university as at December 2020 was 662. Figure 1.1 shows the proportional distribution of the staff by category.




Figure 1. 1: Proportion of Staff Strength as at December 2020




Figure 1.2: Distribution of Academic Staff (Excluding library Staff) based on their Designation as at 31st December 2020




Figure 1.3: Distribution of Academic Staff (Excluding library Staff) based on their Educational level as at 31st December 2020

# Libraries of South Eastern University of Sri Lanka

South Eastern University of Sri Lanka (SEUSL) Libraries is a network of libraries and Museum that includes Main Library, Faculty of Applied Sciences Library and University Cultural Museum. The SEUSL Library works strategically and refers to international best practice for quality assurance. The Library's main achievements in 2020 were;

- i) Strengthen engagement with faculties and students and promote greater involvement of library academics in research by conducting many Research Capacity Building programme, plagiarism detection services, literature search and document delivery services.
- ii) Manages the digitization program and to archive the intellectual capital of SEUSL in institutional repository (DSpace) that facilitate scholarly dissemination and showcase entire breadth of the institution's scholarship and improve the webometrics ranking of the university. The E-repository had 4204 scholarly articles archived as at 31st December 2020 and out of it 896 were uploaded during 2020. There were 48,793 views for the scholarly articles, including from foreign countries.
- iii) Consultancy advices and editorial assistance provided to the University for publishing the Faculty Journal, Proceedings and university publications.
- iv) Conducted teaching and assessing an optional credit course on "Information Literacy programs" to the undergraduates.
- v) Worked collegially and constructively with key university stakeholders, including students, to deliver Library services off the campus to enable our patrons to access to our library learning resources remotely while the university is closed due to COVID 19 outbreak.
- vi) Major or notable donation is received from Embassy of Japan to the value of 829,700.39 under "Read Japan 100 books for Understanding

- Contemporary Japan" programme. His Excellency Mr. Sugiyama Akira, Ambassador of the Japan to Sri Lanka visited the library and handed over the collection on 28th September 2020.
- vii) SEUSL library has taken actions to streamline the processes and procedures of the library services adhering to the 5S system.
- viii) Library academic staff actively contributed to the University for the Institutional Review. Review Team visited the Main Library on 25.02.2020 and Science Library on 21.02.2020 and appreciated the library system and services.
- ix) Provided remote access to Electronic Database such as EMERALD, TAYLOR & FRANCIS and OXFORD by using Shibboleth Access during the closure of university due to COVID 19 pandemic situation. It was noted that the usage statistics of some databases have been increased when compare to the year 2019. A total of 8,593 full text articles have been downloaded by our patrons during the year 2020.
- x) Library this year has purchased only 465 printed books to the value of 396,248.23 to meet the needs of the users of all faculties.
- xi) There were 3756 registered users reported as at 31st December 2020 and out of them 312 new students were enrolled as library members during the year under review.
- xii) Circulations were significantly affected by the pandemic situation. Libraries had a combined total of 31,685 check-ins/checkouts as recorded in the Library Management System. Collaborative common learning spaces with Wifi facilities are provided.
- xiii) A sum of Rs. 69,700.00 was collected as overdue fine from the students of Main Library and Rs. 2,549.00 from the Science library during the year 2020.

#### **Achievements and Recognitions:**

• SEUSL secured the 331st place at the World's most sustainable university in 2020 UI GreenMetric World University Rankings and secured the 1st place in country ranking.



• Institutional Review was successfully concluded in February 2020 (24th to 29th February 2020). The concerted efforts of the academics,

administrative, academic supportive and non-academic staff of the University resulted in securing Grade 'B'.

- Quality assurance review of seven study Programmes has been completed. In which, three Programmes have secured B grades while four Programmes have secured C grades. University has taken initiatives to improve the gradings in future reviews through improving Quality Assurance System within the university.
- End semester examinations and academic programmes were successfully conducted amidst the covid 19 pandemic period via online and physically.
- Enable to enroll the new batch of the students for the academic year 2018/2019 and academic programmes were successfully conducted via online.
- Faculty of Arts and Culture commenced Postgraduate degree programmes by research such as MPhil /PhD in Geography, Philosophy, Political Science, Sociology and PhD in Tamil.
- Proposal for introducing a new Bachelor of Arts Honours in Education degree programme in the Faculty of Arts and Culture has been submitted for the approval of the UGC.
- Proposal developed for introducing a Bachelor of Arts Honours in History degree programme in the Faculty of Arts and Culture has been submitted for the approval of the relevant Authorities.
- The Course Modules Such as Education, English and IT Courses were introduced as new main subjects for Bachelor of Arts degree programme at the faculty.

• 13th General Convocation of the South Eastern University of Sri Lanka was held on 16th and 17th of September 2020 at the University.



Sri Lankan Journal of Technology (SLJOT) was launched by the Faculty
of Technology. Sri Lankan Journal of Technology is one of the peerreviewed journals, which will have periodical publications intended to
further the progress in relevant fields usually by reporting new
research, published in the field of technology.




Figure 1.4: Student enrollments for the last five academic years

- University could expand the new student intake through enhancing access for higher education of the national policy (Figure 1.4).




Figure 1.5: Hostel Occupations: 2015 - 2020

- As at end of December 2020, a total of 67 academic staff completed their PhDs.
- Number of staff have been promoted to the post of professors were 10 as at the end of December 2020.
- Action plan and Procurement plan were completed in a comprehensive manner.

## Failures and Justification

- i. The sea erosion continued to exist in the east part of the land of the University. The university could not arrest the issue with the current scale of capital allocation. However, the university has brought this matter to the consideration of the costal conservation Department and they have promised to take some initiatives to arrest the issue.
- ii. The university is facing the threat of floods during the rainy season due to overflowing of the Gal Oya. The University could not get the flood protection bund established. Even though the university has approached relevant authorities, it is not materialized.

#### iii. Recruitments:

The university could not fill the following carder vacancies,

- Permanent medical officers to the Health Center Doctors are not applying to join the university service as they have better opportunities at a higher salary under the Ministry of Health. However, the Health Center center is functioning with medical officers appointed on part time basis.
- Project manager As engineers with relevant qualification and experience are not willing to serve the University at a low salary.

#### **Future Plans**

- i. To perform curriculum revisions of academic programmes informed by a consistent and a comprehensive policy for curriculum review.
- ii. To have the International Conference on Science and Technology in the month of July 2021 by the Faculty of Technology for the first time.
- iii. To commence External degree programme in Information & Communication Technology offered by Department of Information and Communication Technology of the Faculty of Technology.
- iv. To obtain ISO certification to the Faculty of Technology;
- v. To upgrade the Computer Unit of the Faculty of Arts and Culture into Department of Information and Technology.
- vi. To regularize standard operating policy for regular and standard review, upgrading and reviewing curricula for all study programmes.
- vii. To conduct curricular consultative programmes for all study programmes.
- viii. To enhance the optimal implementation of LMS.
- ix. To undergo quality assurance review of academic programmes which had not been reviewed.
- x. To take steps to increase the impact of our researchers.
- xi. Steps to form Department of Computer Sciences and Department of Human Resource Management under the Faculty of Applied Sciences and the Faculty of Management and Commerce respectively.

- xii. To initiate the academic Programmes those are demanded by the society and industry.
- xiii. To introduce comprehensive enterprise research plans to automate and integrate co-organization functions.
- xiv. To codify the university calendar and policy framework.
- xv. Qualifying new linkage with other international partners for collaborative research.
- xvi. To stimulate staff to make University's grants and other competitive grants.
- xvii. Encouraging staff to upload their research articles in popular research networks, such as: Research Gate, Google Scholar, Academia, etc. to impact on University's ranking.




Figure 9.1: Employability by Faculty

#### **SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT POLICIES**

#### 1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

#### 1.1. General Information

South Eastern University of Sri Lanka (SEUSL) is established under the Universities Act No 16 of 1978, and located in the Eastern Province, Ampara District, Oluvil in Sri Lanka.

#### 1.2. Principal activities and nature of operations

South Eastern University of Sri Lanka is one of the National universities mainly operates on Government funds and promoting higher education and research in the field of Engineering, Social Sciences, Applied Sciences, Islamic and Arabic Languages, Commerce and Management and Technology.

#### 2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

#### 2.1. Statement of Compliance

The Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Changes in Equity and the Statement of Cash Flows together with the accounting policies and notes have been prepared in compliance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accounts of Sri Lanka and the requirements of the Universities Act No 16 of 1978 and subsequence amendments thereto. The Annual Statement of Accounts comprises the financial statements of the year 2020.

#### 2.2. Basis of Measurement

The financial statements of SEUSL have been prepared on an accrual basis and under the historical cost convention unless stated otherwise.

#### 2.3. Functional and Presentation Currency

The financial statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees (SLR), which is the functional currency and presentation currency and all values are rounded to the nearest rupees unless stated otherwise.

#### 2.4. Comparative Information

The comparative figures have been re-arranged where necessary to conform to the presentation in the current year. Also the last year figures shown for comparison purpose.

#### 2.5. Use of Estimates and Judgments

The presentation and preparation of financial statements in conformity with SLPSASs requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of the accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these provisional estimates and judgmental decisions.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision effects on that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

#### **Accounting Policies**

#### 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 3.1. PROPERTY PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

#### (a) Recognition and Measurement

Property, Plant & Equipment are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation. The cost of property, plant & equipment is the cost of purchase or construction together with any incidental expenses thereon.

#### (b) Cost

The cost of property, plant & equipment comprise its purchase or construction cost and any directly contributable cost of bringing the asset to working condition for its intended use.

#### (c) Depreciation

Depreciation is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance on the straight line basis at the following rates per annum in order to write off the cost of such assets over their estimated useful lives. Depreciation is provided on pro rata basis on the asset purchased/constructed/disposed of during the year.

Land is valued at fair value in year 2011, as determined by the Valuation Department, Uva Provincial Office. Meanwhile, Mountlavinia APC land is valued in 2016.

#### (d) Revaluation of the Property, Plant, & Equipments

The lands of the university have been revalued as at 31st December 2011 and recognized to the books of accounts.

On the request of SEUSL the Government Valuation Department revalued the Buildings which had been fully depreciated in the books of Accounts and the revalued amounts have been incorporated into the accounts with effect from 01st January 2020.

#### **Accounting Policies**

On the recommendation of the Audit and Management Committee and with the approval of the University Council, three teams were assigned to re-value the Furniture, Equipment and Sports Equipment which were already fully depreciated. Accordingly the revalued amount of Equipment and Sports Equipment have been incorporated to the accounts with effect from 01st July 2020 with the approval of the University Council.

The revaluation of Furniture is yet to be completed and the re-valued amount will be incorporated into the accounts, with the approval of the University Council.

#### ('e) Disposal of Unserviceable Articles

By following the relevant chapters and subsequent amendments of the Establishment Code of the University Grants Commission, a total number of 1,153 fully depreciated unserviceable items were sold by auctioning to the employees of SEUSL with the approval of the university Council.

#### 3.2. TAX

#### (a) Income Tax

University is not liable to pay income tax on its' net income according to the prevailing tax rules.

#### (b) Payee Tax

University currently remits payee tax after deducting from monthly salaries of the liable employees for income tax which is not a part of the University expenditure. Hence, Payee tax is not disclosed in the accounts of the University.

#### 3.3. INVENTORIES

Inventories of the University have been physically verified and valued at cost as at 31st December 2020. The cost incurred in bringing inventories to its percent location, are accounted on FIFO basis.

#### 3.3.1

Stock verification as at 31.12.2020 was carried out by the Board of Survey appointed by the Vice Chancellor (Accounting Officer), SEUSL.

The Physical quantities were verified and values were calculated. The certified values of the stock at the Main Store at the SEUSL/Oluvil premises, Maintenance (Sub Store) at SEUSL/Oluvil premises and the sub store at the Faculty of the Applied Science, Sammanthurai were verified and the values are taken in the Books of Accounts.

#### 3.4. TRADE AND OTHER RECEIVABLES

Trade and other receivables are stated at the amount they are estimated as per SLPSAS 01 that is due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting date. No provision has been made for bad and doubtful receivables.

#### 3.4.1 BOND VIOLATION AND LOAN OUTSTANDING

There is an outstanding loan balance amount of Rs. 29,058.00 from an academic staff and Bond Violation aggregating amount of Rs. 1,388,219.43 from two academic staff who have vacated their post.

#### 3.5. INVESTMENTS IN FIXED DEPOSITS

Investments in Fixed Deposits are stated at present value (SLR).

#### 3.6. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and Cash Equivalents disclosed in the statement of financial position and the cash flow statement comprised balances of current and saving accounts and the cash in hand.

#### 3.7. LIABILITIES & PROVISIONS

All known liabilities as at the balance sheet date are included in the financial statements and adequate provisions are made for liabilities which are known to exist but the amount of which cannot be determined accurately.

Obligations payable on demand or within one year of the balance sheet date are treated as current liabilities in the balance sheet. Liabilities payable after one year from the balance sheet date are treated as non-current liabilities in the balance sheet.

## 3.8. GRATUITY

Provision for gratuity was made in accordance with gratuity Act No 12 of 1983. The Gratuity liability is not externally funded nor actually valued but provisioned. The gratuity fund Account is shown under the Non-Current liabilities in the Statement of financial position, based on half month salary as of the last month on financial year of all employees for each completed year of service, commencing from the first year of service.

### 3.9. UNIVERSITY PROVIDENT AND EMPLOYEES' TRUST FUND

Employees of the University are eligible for University Provident Fund (UPF) contributions and Employees' Trust Fund (ETF) contribution in line with respective status and regulations. The University contributes the defined percentages (15%) and (3%) of gross emoluments of employees to an approved employees' provident fund and to the employees trust fund respectively, which are operated extremely.

#### 3.10. ACCOUNTING FOR GRANT

Grants that compensate the University for Expenses incurred are recognized as revenue in the Income Statement in the same period in which the expenses are recognized. Grants that compensate the University for the Cost of as asset are recognized in the Income Statement on a systematic basis over the useful life time of the related asset.

#### 3.11. CAPITAL COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

All material commitments and contingent liabilities are considered and where necessary adjustments or disclosures are made in the financial statements.

## 3.12. DISCLOSE OF ACCOUNTING INFORMATION OF THE UNIT

### Center for External Degrees and Professional Learning (CEDPL)

Accounts of Center for External Degrees and Professional Learning have been prepared separately and also incorporated with the University Accounts.

## Postgraduate Unit (FMC, FAC, FT)

Accounts of Postgraduate Units (FMC, FAC, and FT) have been prepared separately and also incorporated with the University Accounts.

#### **Incorporation of University Units Accounts**

When preparing the Financial Statements of the University, amount of Rs. 9,903,150.03 Receivable from Centre for External Degrees & Professional Learning (CEDPL) and Post Graduates Units (FMC, FAC & FT) and Rs. 13,000,000.00 payable to CEDPL are set off.

## 3.13. INCOME STATEMENT

## 3.13.1. REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the university and that it can be reliably measured.

- (a) Enrolment fees from students are recognized as revenue on receipt.
- (b) Fees on examinations, seminars, courses and other educational and activities are recognized as revenue on completion of such activity.
- (c) The fees on fee-levying courses recognized to the income statement based on the stage of completion of each courses as at the year end. Lecture fees and payments which are related to future periods are shown in the Balance Sheet as income received in advance under the Reserve & Restricted funds.
- (d) Interest income is recognized on accrual basis.
- (e) Revenue from grant is recognized when control of the contribution or right to receive the contribution is confirmed.
- (f) Sponsorship related activities are recognized on receipt
- (g) Other income is recognized on accrual basis.

## 3.13.2. EXPENDITURE RECOGNITION

Expenses are recognized in the income statement on the basis of direct association between cost incurred and the earning of specific items of the income. All expenditures incurred in the running of the university and maintaining the capital assets have been charged to revenue in arriving at the surplus/ deficit for the year. Expenses on examinations, seminars, courses, and other educational activities are recognized in the income statement on completion of such activity.

## 3.14. EVENTS AFTER THE REPORTING DATE

The materiality of events occurring after the Balance Sheet date has been considered and appropriate adjustments, wherever necessary, have been made in the accounts.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the South Eastern University of Sri Lanka for the year ended 31 December 2020 in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

## 1. Financial Statements

## 1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of the financial statements of the South Eastern University of Sri Lanka ("University") for the year ended 31 December 2020 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2020 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in net assets and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Sub-section 107(5) and Section 108 of the Universities Act, No.16 of 1978 and provisions of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Section 108 (1) of the University Act, appear in this report. My report to Parliament in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (6) of the Constitution will be tabled in due course.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in the basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University as at 31 December 2020, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.



## 1.2 Basis for Qualified Opinion

- (a) The useful lifetime of fixed assets had not been reviewed annually in terms of paragraph 65 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07. Property, Plant and Equipment costing Rs. 483,321,635 had been fully depreciated but still being used by the end of the year under review. No action had been taken to rectify the estimated error in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 03.
- (b) Depreciation of an asset begins when it is available for use in terms of paragraph 69 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07. Even though, 08 Laboratory Equipments costing Rs. 39,399,513 which were received during the years 2017 to 2019 had not been ready for use as at 04 March 2021, the depreciation had been calculated since the date of goods received. As a result, the Accumulated Depreciation and General Reserve had been overstated and understated respectively by Rs. 16,505,637 in the financial statements.
- (c) Air Conditioners for Centre for External Degrees and Professional Learning at a cost of Rs. 3,979,048 had been procured through the Self Financing Activities in September 2020. However, the cost of the assets had been taken as income for the year under review instead of taken amortization. As a result, the deficit for the year under review had been understated by the net amount of Rs. 3,683,966 in the financial statements.
- (d) Fully depreciated Office Equipments and Sports Equipment costing of Rs.57,004,044 had been revaluated at aggregating to Rs. 20,637,790 on 01 July 2020 with the additional life time periods of 2 to 5 years as per the Council memo. However, due to an arithmetical error in calculating the depreciation for the revalued assets, the depreciation had been understated by Rs. 3,310,493 during the year under review. Therefore, the deficit of the year understated by that amount in the financial statements.



(e) Forty-four iMac Computers costing of Rs. 23,055,912 which procured through the Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) Project in the year 2018 had not been accounted in the financial statements of the University.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibilities, under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

## 1.3 Other information included in the University's 2020 Annual Report.

The other information comprises the information included in the University's 2020 Annual Report but does not include the financial statements and my auditor's report thereon, which I have obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report. Management is responsible for the other information.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and I do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information identified above and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If based on the work I have performed on the other information that I have obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard.

# 1.4 Responsibilities of Management and those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determine is necessary to enable the



preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the University ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intend to liquidate the University or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the University financial reporting process.

As per Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, the University is required to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared of the University.

# 1.5 Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also:

Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements,
whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to
those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide
a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting
from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve



collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design
  audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose
  of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the University ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the University to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

## 2. Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

- 2.1 National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 includes specific provisions for following requirements.

- 2.1.3 The financial statements presented includes all the recommendations made by me in the previous year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iv) of the National Audit-Act, No. 19 of 2018; except for the Para 1.2 (a).
- 2.2 Based on the procedures performed and evidence obtained were limited to matters that are material, nothing has come to my attention;
- 2.2.1 to state that any member of the governing body of the University has any direct or indirect interest in any contract entered into by the University which are out of the normal cause of business as per the requirement of section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018;
- 2.2.2 to state that the University has not complied with any applicable written law, general and special directions issued by the governing body of the University as per the requirement of section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 except for;

The concurrence and prior approval of the Ministry of the Finance and the Ministry of Education and the Finance Committee of the University with regards to the Fixed Deposit totaling of Rs. 31,559,910 which invested in year 2020 had not been obtained.

All staff should be entered their arrivals and departures in the finger print scanner. However, the academic staff not comply with that.

- 2.2.4 to state that the resource of the University has procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws as per the requirement of section 12 (h) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018;

## 2.3 Other Audit Observations

- (a) Receivables balances from distress loan, festival advance, salary receivables, bond violations and Contractors and Institutions aggregating Rs. 9,719,274 had remained outstanding for a period ranging from 01 to 19 years without being recovered as at 31 December 2020.
- (b) The retention money payables to the contractors and suppliers totaling Rs.12,834,860 had been remained for period ranging from 2 to 7 years without being settled as at 31 December 2020. In this regard, adequate action had not been taken to pay the retention money or to treat as the income of the University.
- (c) The Laboratory Equipments aggregating Rs. 93.5 million which had been procured during the period from year 2017 to 2019 had been idled without being utilized for the intended purposes for the periods ranging from 1 to 4 years. Further, 02 air conditioners, 20 computer tables and an electronic screen aggregate cost of Rs. 461,577 and 02 lecture halls which allocated to the Center for External Degrees and Professional Learning during the period from 2013 to 2016 had not been utilized for the intended purposes for over 5 years.
- (d) The tender for the procurement of CNC Machine EDM Solid had been awarded to the amount of Rs. 11,647,200 to a supplier on 25 November 2016. However, the supplier had not proceeded due to the delay of tender awarding and price escalation. Subsequently, another Invitation for bids had been advertised and procured for Rs. 21,104,229 from another supplier in 2019. As a result, the University had paid an additional amount of Rs. 9,457,029 than the first awarded price.



(e) The construction works of a Laboratory Block for the Faculty of Applied Science had been commenced on 31 October 2011 and completed on 15 February 2014 with the cost of Rs. 84,156,395. Further, a sum of Rs. 1,856,467 had been spent for the electrical fittings in year 2016. However, the Laboratory Block had not been utilized for the intended purpose for over 6 years due to the delays in the procurement of necessary Laboratory Equipments and incompletion of the drainage, gas and water lines needed for the laboratory.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the South Eastern University of Sri Lanka for the year ended 31 December 2020 in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

This has reference to your audit report dated 20<sup>th</sup> July 2020. We give below our observations for the queries raised in the report.

## 1. Financial Statements

- (a) As per the section 5.5.2 of the Commission Circular 04/2016, dated 01st March 2016, which states that the amount utilized (not the amortized amount) should be deducted from the development fund (Respective Vote) and credited to the differed revenue account. However, for the better presentation of the Financial Statements, as suggested in the audit query, action will be taken to spread out the capital expenditure amount and to recognize the utilized amount as
- (b) Due to the limitation of the fund received from the General Treasury, all the procurements are made on a priority basis. Likewise, the procurement of the Laboratory Equipment mentioned

in the query was also procured based on the requirement and necessity of the user departments assuming those will be utilized upon delivery and installation. Further, the warranty periods of equipment commence from the date of delivery by the supplier.

As the usual practice followed in procurement of equipment, these items were also installed along with other machineries ready for use and, the depreciation was calculated accordingly.

It is the responsibility of the Head of the User Department and Dean of the faculty to make sure the equipment purchased are used for the practical sessions of the students. If the equipment is not used, it is the inefficiency of the Dean of the faculty.

- (c) As per the section 5.5.2 of the Commission Circular 04/2016, dated 01st March 2016, which states that the amount utilized (not the amortized amount) should be deducted from the development fund (Respective Vote) and credited to the differed revenue account. However, for the better presentation of the Financial Statements, as suggested in the audit query, action will be taken to spread out the capital expenditure amount and to recognize the utilized amount as the income of the year over the assets life time.
- (d) Revaluation of assets was done for the first time by the University. In that process the Office equipment and Sports items mentioned in the query were also revalued for the first time in the year 2020. Accordingly, Fixed Assets Register in the package was updated with the revalued amount in the same year. However, due to an error in coding by the software supplier, there was a calculation mistake that had taken place in the calculation of the depreciation of the said revalued assets. Therefore, actions will be taken to

incorporate the difference in the amount of Rs. 3.3 Mn in the financial year 2021.

- (e) Financial statements of the AHEAD Project is maintained separately by the Operational Technical Secretariat (OTS) in SEUSL and sent to the Operations and Monitoring Support Team (OMST) in Colombo. However, action will be taken to incorporate the figures on annual basis as stated in the letter quoted in the audit query, after getting the information from the OTS.

- (i). In the year 2020, earned fund balances and bond violation amounts were only deposited in the fixed deposits.
  - However, action will be taken to get the concurrence and prior approval of the Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Education (Line Ministry), University Council and the Finance Committee as stated in the Audit Query and referred circulars therein, before depositing those in the FD.
- (ii). As a common practice, the arrival and departure of academic staff are not maintained in the public University system in Sri Lanka. Further, the University system is facing challenges in implementing this system to the academic staff even though this matter is continuously raised by the audit queries.

(b) Actions has been taken either to pay the retention balances or transfer the unclaimed due amount remaining for more than two

years in to the University Revenue with the recommendation of the relevant sections

(c) Most of the equipment procured have been used for the intended purposes. Being a newly established Faculty, the Department had planned to secure the required space and equipment simultaneously, given the circumstances and urgency. Due to the limitations in securing the capital fund for the expansion of space, commissioning of some of the equipment had to be delayed.

(d)

 The bids were invited by National Competitive Bidding method (NCB) to purchase the following 04 items at the total estimated value of Rs. 45 million by requesting Rs. 900,000 bid security to cover the bid of the given 04 items and with the bid bond validity period up to 01.11.2016. Details are given below.

- Accordingly, bids were received from 08 suppliers for the above 04 items and subsequently all such received bids were opened on 08.07.2016.
- Since we had some internal delays such as conducting TEC (TEC members were experts from other established Universities) and DPC meetings, we requested all the suppliers on 26.10.2016 to submit an extension of the above bid security validity period up to 30.11.2016 and during this period we conducted TEC and DPC meetings on 18.11.2016 and 24.11.2016 respectively and had sent the letter of awarding on 25.11.2016 to selected 03 suppliers as given in the above table.
- However, CMC Engineering Expert GmbH had not submitted
  the extended bid bond and instead, they had sent us a letter
  stating that, they are unable to proceed with the above
  mentioned tender since their supplier has increased the prices.
- Subsequently, based on the letter of CMC Engineering Expert GmbH, we had arranged a TEC meeting to discuss and recommend regarding this matter and accordingly, TEC recommended to award to the next substantially responsive bidder. However, due to non- availability of funds at this point of time and the bid validity period was expired, this procurement was not further processed.
- We did not have sufficient time to recover the bid bond of Rs.
   202,560 relating to the supply of CNC machine EDM Solid for the bid value of Rs. 10,128,000 from CMC Engineering Expert

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**GmbH** due to the expiry of the bond and not receiving the extension of the bid bond.

Since the validity of the above bid was expired on 31.10.2016, we could not go ahead with the same bids. Hence, the bids were reinvited on 20.06.2018 under National Competitive Bidding by giving sufficient opportunities for competitors. The price difference is mainly due to the country of origin and the country of manufacture of the newly purchased machine which is a European product and the country of origin and the country of manufacture (the above one is from Taiwan). Normally, performance of these type of European products of similar specification is considerably higher than the Taiwan, Asian and Chinese products. Apart from that, during the period of 02 years, the price has also affected due to the inflation and price fluctuation of the country.

(e) Water supply, drainage and gas supply works are in progress, hopefully it can be completed by mid of December, 2021
